Homemade Bubbles

Ingredients:
3 cups of water
1 cup of dish soap
¼ cup of corn syrup
Directions:
Stir gently and let sit for
1 hour before using.

Sing a BUBBLE SONG... (sung to Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star)


"Bubbles floating all around;
